I used a Nikon Z50 with the 1.4 extender on a Nikon 100-400mm lens (560mm) at f 16 and 1/1000 of a second with an ISO of 45600 as the owl was in shade with most of the light coming from behind him."



Immature Eastern Bluebird by Lynn Chandler

Lynn: "I have had more Bluebirds this year than ever in the 26 years I have lived here. I had a female nest in two wren jugs! There are 6 to 8 daily eating meal worms faster than I can fill up their feeder! Taken Monday at 9:29 AM."

Lynn: "This cutie was busy in my holly tree and I thought I would never get a good photo of him! Taken Friday, April 26 at 12:42 PM."



Gray Catbirds by Pete Peterman

Pete: "The Gray Catbirds were photographed on May 5 at NN Park. I thought they were having a conversation so I used f 16 on the Nikon Z50 with 1.4 extender on a Nikon 100-400mm lens (560mm) in order to get both in focus at 1/500 of a second with the ISO all the way up (51250) as it was in deep shade and early morning, just after 7 AM."

Red-headed Woodpecker by Pete Peterman

Pete: "The Red-headed Woodpecker was photographed at the Nags Head Wood Preserve, NC on May 29. The sun angle was not ideal but I could not maneuver as I was on a water inlet on the bay side where the dead tree was being excavated by the Woodpecker. I used the Nikon Z50 with the 1.4 extender on a Nikon 100-400mm lens (560mm) at f 16 and 1/1000 of a second with an ISO of 900."



Broad-winged Hawk by Pete Peterman

Pete: "The Broad-winged Hawk was photographed at Alligator River NWR on May 31 around noon as I was traveling by car on the Wildlife Loop. I used the Nikon Z50 with the 1.4 extender on a Nikon 100-400mm lens (560mm) at f 16 and 1/1000 of a second with an ISO of 200."



Orchard Oriole by Pete Peterman

Pete: "The Orchard Oriole (first summer male) was also photographed in Saltville, VA on that same

morning [of the June 8 VSO trip] further along the trail. I used the Nikon Z50 with the 1.4 extender on a Nikon 100-400mm lens (560mm) at f 16 and 1/1000 of a second with an ISO of 1400."

Pete: "The Red-tailed Hawk was photographed later that day (5 May) around noon in the open field by the arboretum at NN Park. I used the Nikon Z50 with the 1.4 extender on a Nikon 100-400mm lens (560mm) at 1/1000 of a second at f 16 and an ISO of 250."

Youth and Age among Griffin Vultures

Youths frequently moving between sleeping sites in different locations? Becoming more "set in their ways" as adults? The older individuals spending the night in the same places but with weaker social relationships? That's the Eurasian Griffon Vulture according to Holler Ober as reported in https://www.sciencedaily.com/releases/2024/08/240 830163955.htm . Marta Acacio, a postdoctoral researcher at Tel Aviv University, led a team in an exacting study of 142 vultures using a 15-year GPS-tracking dataset. It was published in our Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences (PNAS).

Acacio et al. found that older vultures had more "site fidelity" and "fixed movement routines". Was it the case that those younger birds, the population of which behaved differently overall, simply expired before those having preferred "fidelity" and "fixed" characteristics? Probably not, as deduced by the researchers who could track individual birds for a dozen years. They also learned that "older vultures... display weaker social relationships compared to younger conspecifics" and are more likely to show aggression and dominance.

Griffon Vultures have weights and wingspans comparable to American White Pelicans, flocks of which have been spotted on some the annual field trips to Hog Island National Wildlife Refuge. Wikipedia informs that some birds elevate their metabolic rate while flying to16 times their basal metabolic rate. That ratio for the Griffon Vulture is only 1.43; they're efficient flyers.
